What are Journal Topics?

Journal Topics are an opportunity for students to get their brain in "science mode" and to practice their writing skills. The topic or question is designed to elicit a recall of information, or to encourage students to pre-think about our upcoming content.


When/how do students complete Journals?


The Journal Topic is projected on the front board when students walk in. After the bell rings, students have the first five minutes of class to work on their Journal. **Anything** they don't finish is homework to be finished during Advisor or at home.

Journals are also part of the makeup work for my class and must be completed by students who are absent.

How are Journals graded?

Students earn their Journal points by doing the following each day:

- 1) Write down the Journal Topic. +5 pts
- 2) Write three complete sentences in response. +5 pts each

= 20 points total

Student's response sentences do <u>not</u> have to be correct to get full credit; they just have to show thought & effort to earn the points. So, if students aren't getting full credit on their Journal scores it's because they aren't finishing their work.

We grade Journals every Friday. One Journal is randomly chosen from the previous five school days by a student rolling a die.

We never grade the current Friday's Journal entry! That way students always have time to finish later if necessary.

For example: Journals from Fri 9/9, Mon 9/12, Tues 9/13, Wed 9/14, and Thurs 9/15 would be graded on Fri 9/16.

Journals will add up to a *significant* number of points by the end of each quarter. Please keep an eye on Journal grades in PowerSchool to make sure your student is earning these easy points. ©
