

## Dear Parents, Teachers, and PEAKers,

Students spent their week at PEAK learning (and simulating) the many ways that wolves use to communicate. They created headbands with movable wolf ears to show how wolves use their ears and facial expressions to convey their moods. They used pool noodle "tails" and body language to demonstrate pack hierarchies and dominance. And they howled as packs to show their connections to their packmates.

Students also became wolves and elk in an exciting simulation of hunting for prey, and how populations change over time depending on the successes of the hunts. We'll continue these simulations in the future by adding in the human element to show how habitat loss and livestock predation have become very serious issues.

This week, students will help to redeem the wolf in story form! Students performed skits last week, and the wolf was always the villain of the tale. We're going to turn the tables and let the wolf be other roles in original creative stories that the students will write and share with dramatic storytelling.

Students will also try their "paws" at creating howl languages to communicate with their packs, and will demonstrate these outdoors.

Lastly, we'll continue our research with the Five Areas of Investigating Living Things to become expert wolf biologists. This research will be presented in PowerPoint presentations that will be shared with you!
