Greetings from the music room! This past trimester has flown by, but we've accomplished a lot in the music room! The students have worked on their basic skills of beat keeping, tuneful singing and creative movement, as well as more advanced skills of reading melodic notation on the staff and even some melodic dictation.

### Kindergarten

In kindergarten we continue to work on the foundational skills all musicians need to be successful in music. These skills include: keeping a steady beat, matching pitch, voice choice (singing or speaking) and differentiating between high and low sounds.

We've added many new songs to our repertoire this trimester and we've even ventured into the world of folk dancing (one of my favorite realms!). Some of our new songs and rhymes include: Down by the Bay (a great echo song to ask your student to sing with vou): Wise Old Owl: Blue Bird: Grandma's Glasses: Alice the Camel; Bling Blang (a student favorite!); Frog in the Meadow; Cobbler Cobbler and Hickory Dickory Dock.

We tried our hands (and feet?) at two beginning folk dances this trimester, too. Goin' Down the Railroad and Kindergarten Reel. Kindergarteners also moved creatively to a couple of new classical selections, including: Siciliana by Respighi and The Aquarium by Saint-Saens.

### pt Irade

1st graders continue to work, and make excellent progress, on the same foundational skills as in kindergarten. The songs and rhymes have gotten more complex this semester and their opportunity to create movements on their own, with little guidance from me, continues to grow.

Some of the songs and rhymes we tackled this trimester include: Charlie Over the Ocean: Tongo: John the Rabbit; I Have Lost My Closet Key; These Are Mother's Knives and Forks; Old Bald Eagle; Did you Ever See a Lassie: All the Birds: The Horse Stood Around and Rig-a-Jig-Jig.

1<sup>st</sup> graders also continue their journey in creative movement, both independently and following a leader. Sometimes we listen to stories and we move to illustrate the story with movement instead of pictures. Other times, we listen to classical music and follow the leader.



## What Did We Learn?

### 2<sup>nd</sup> **∐rade** (2& € 2/3<del>]</del>)

2<sup>nd</sup> graders have ventured into the world of learning to read musical notation! They've learned to decode some familiar songs and rhymes with rhythm syllables, and soon will be moving on to reading the actual notation.

Some songs and activities we've accomplished this trimester include: Lightning Bugs; Yes or No?; Are You Sleeping; The Wild Horseman; Down the River; Alabama Gal; Take Your Feet; Old House; Dumaine St. play-along; Above the Plains and Ring Around the Rosie.

### 3rd Grade (3B, MIH & MIS)

3B has begun composing their own rhythms in compound meter, which is the next step in learning how to read and write music (music literacy). Lower Montessori is working on reading melodic notation and will soon start writing melodic notation! They've also been working on plenty of songs as well as many folk dances!

Songs, rhymes and dances include: The Viennese Musical Clock; They Syncopated Clock; I Roll the Ball; Pay Me My Money Down; Bounce High; Chairs to Mend; Biddy Biddy; A Tisket A Tasket; Sasha; Bow Wow Wow; Pass One Window; Fais Dodo and Galopede.
