Students will continue to use a variety of sources ranging in planned usage of; *National Geographic, TCI, TCR, PBS, John Green, Britanica, Khan Academy, mini video clips & documentaries [including TedEd's, Modern Marvels, Biography, Red Terror, History Channels 'The Berlin Wall' and even CNN's multi-series 'The Cold War,' Ken Burns, etc.], reputable news sources and documents, as well as well as power points, art work, photography, discussions, debates, and even a lengthy unit covering propaganda from multiple perspectives.*

Our content speaks to our <u>C3</u> standards and assists in not only understanding the Cold War era and concepts of unity and division, but also enhances numerous skills. The sources and skills we are using are fairly mapped out so I am happy to answer any additional questions where detail is required.
