Summary of the Work:

The Crucible is a dramatic play set in the Puritan town of Salem, Massachusetts, and focusing on the Salem Witch Trials of 1692. Arthur Miller, a prolific playwright, designed *The Crucible* as a deliberate parallel between the Salem Witch Trials and the Communist Red Scare that America was experiencing at the time.

The play presents the tragic hero, John Proctor, a respected farmer, defending himself against the charges of lustful teenager Abigail Williams, with whom John has committed adultery. The entire community is in an uproar about suspected witchcraft. Conflicts are intensified when officials governed by Puritan theocracy are called in to settle the matter of witchcraft.

Notes on the Text:

The Crucible addresses the historical time of the Salem Witch Trials and is based on Miller's research; however, Miller takes creative liberties, and therefore the plot is not historically accurate. Characters may be hung or put to death, though the specific trials and charges may not be accurate.

Connection to the Curriculum:

The introduction to the literary period of colonialism and the historical and cultural influences each is a significant part of the junior curriculum. *The Crucible* also helps students see how literature can provide effective social criticism.

At the same time *The Crucible* allows students to engage with the elements of allegory and point of view.
